Background Information

Artist Reflection

"There are a lot of dark issues in our history, but there's a lot of good, and that's the balance ... We keep moving forward. That's what this board is about. There is a mother walking with the boy. This is about what you're leaving for the younger, next generation. This is what they are inheriting if we don't change so many of the directions we are going in.

There are different symbols in the painting. You grow up hearing the American dream, the white picket fence, so I stuck a picket fence in there. This is what you are dreaming, and this is what's behind it- climate change."
